

Good Friday People, Easter Day People

The great celebrations of Good Friday and Easter feel a long way off as I write in the first week in Lent. But to think of Good Friday and Easter Day as just two days, albeit very important days, in the year is to misunderstand Good Friday and Easter Day in the Christian experience.



It is relatively easy as Christians to think of ourselves as Easter Day people. We live the other side of the resurrection. We have the gift of the Holy Spirit who helps us know the presence of the resurrected Jesus with us at all times. Living as Good Friday people is more difficult to grapple with. It suggests the need to engage with the dark and painful side of life. Which is exactly why we need to live as Good Friday people as well as Easter Day people.

As I write, war is raging in Ukraine; people in Afghanistan are selling their kidneys as they strive to meet the rising cost of their daily bread; we continue to feel the effects of Covid even as we seek to leave the pandemic behind. We can be in no doubt. The fallen world in which we live has a dark and painful side to it. If I need further reminders of that I need only to think of the privileged hours which I spend with the very seriously ill, the dying and the bereaved. I am entirely sincere when I say that these are privileged hours. Yet these experiences also remind me of the dark and painful side of life which, all of us, sooner or later, must grapple with.

Yes, as Christians we are Easter Day people. We live in the light of the resurrection, and we rejoice in that. But we must also be Good Friday people living in a broken and hurting world.

If we are to cope with the reality of the darker, more painful side of our lives and of the world in which we live, we must be Good Friday people, able to bear pain and desolation in order to be Easter Day people, able to bring the hope of the resurrection to more difficult side of life.

If we want to truly live in the light of the resurrection, we must also walk the way of crucifixion. We can only do that when we live as both Good Friday people and as Easter Day people.

In his book 23 Days: A story of love, death and God, Francis Bridger quotes the Old Testament scholar Walter Bruggeman who says:

"The way to Easter is Good Friday. The victory of the resurrection requires the vulnerability of the crucifixion..."

We cannot have Easter Day without Good Friday. As we prepare ourselves to celebrate Easter this Lent, mark Good Friday as well as celebrate the joy of the resurrection on Easter Day. Living comfortably with Good Friday is the only way we can bring real resurrection hope to a broken world.

Yours in our crucified and risen Jesus.

The next meetings will be on Thursday 7th April & 5th May from 10-12noon! Everyone is very welcome to pop in for as little or as long as they wish.




St David's Patronal Service

Saint Mary Magdalene

At Easter we think of Jesus, his crucifixion and resurrection, and the women who found his empty tomb. One woman said to be present throughout these traumatic events was Mary Magdalene, subject of historical, Biblical and legendary writings and art. Mary was the most common name during Jesus' lifetime and this woman was distinguished from others by her reference to her birthplace, Magdala, a fishing village on the Sea of Galilee. At various times in history, she has been known as a great beauty, a loose woman and a supporter of Jesus during his ministry. There are records of wealthy women supporting synagogues with their

money at this time, so that is a possible role for Mary. Her sinful nature may be a reference to simply not following all the demands of Jewish law, but is more likely to have come from Pope Gregory I who, in the

middle ages, wrote that her sins had been of a sexual nature. The Bible has more than a dozen references to her as a part of the group of women who followed Jesus during his ministry and formed the Christian church after his execution. There is some confusion about her exact identity, some writings say that she was the sister of Lazarus and Martha, some that she was the un-named woman who anointed Jesus' feet with perfumed oil and some that she was a separate person to both of these options.

Whoever Mary was, she is recorded in the Bible as a woman present during Christ's crucifixion, either alone or with other women. Perhaps the women remained at the cross because they were less likely than the male disciples to be arrested, perhaps they were braver than the

was taken down from the cross Marv Magdalene accompanied the body to the burial site. Two days later she is said to be walking towards the tomb when she discovers that it is empty. Meeting two angels they tell her that Jesus is risen from the dead, although when she meets a man walking alone she mistakes him for the gardener until she recognises his voice.

After the events of the resurrection we hear nothing of Mary until she appears in 'The Golden Legend'. This story says that 14 years after the crucifixion she is thrown into a boat with other Christians and set adrift on the Mediterranean Sea. By some miracle the boat

> eventually washes ashore at Marseille in France. There Mary converts the Governor to Christianity by praying that his wife should become pregnant. The Governor decides to sail to Rome to meet the apostle Peter. along with his wife. A

storm leads to her giving birth in the boat and losing her own life. Grief stricken, the Governor puts the living child and his wife's body on an island. After two years in Rome the Governor sails home to France, stopping at the island to remember his wife and child. They are both alive, a double miracle attributed to the power of Mary Magdalene. Meanwhile Mary spends the remaining thirty years of her life living in a cave in Provence. Even in death she is still remembered, and her relics preserved in Aix en Provence, then moved to Vezelay in 771 AD. Today her skull is displayed at Saint Maximin-La-Sainte – Baume along with a tibia bone. She remains the Patron Saint of women and order of preachers, recognition for her steadfastness

beside Jesus and her role in his life and death.



Chester Cathedral: Pilgrim Porch

Every parish church and their associated daughter churches are invited to participate in this exciting and historic commission.

Led by Chester Cathedral and esteemed Cheshire-based artist, Stephen Broadbent, Pilgrim Porch aims to capture a snapshot of worshipping life across the Diocese of Chester. Every contribution will be encapsulated into a new permanent architectural feature and artwork which is to be installed at the west doors of Chester Cathedral.

"Engineering made to last"

The finished installation will be a sculptural bronze porch with ceremonial glass doors positioned at the west end of the Cathedral. It will be unveiled later this year as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. The hinges that will support the 3m tall doors have been designed to last at least 300 years.

A fitting tribute to the Queen

The Bishop of Chester, Mark Tanner says: "It is relatively rare that an artist is commissioned to create a new permanent fixture for the interior of a medieval Cathedral. Even more special, though, that such a project can mark and celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of a reigning monarch. We hope that this project will be a fitting tribute to the remarkable reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and a permanent enhancement to the fabric of our Cathedral."

Artist Stephen Broadbent says: "I am asking every church in the diocese to share an image that is significant and meaningful to them.

Perhaps it's an image of a piece of stained glass or a carved detail in the parish church, or another notable element of your worshipping community.

"Together, with almost 400 other contributions from across the diocese, we will create a unique permanent artwork that will form a labyrinth design, symbolically connecting every church to each other and to the Cathedral – the Mother Church of the diocese."

St. David's has chosen the beautiful West Window depicting the doves in the form of a cross. This was installed for the Millennium and symbolises the doves of peace, the Holy Spirit and St. David.

St. Oswald's has chosen the beautiful carved painted cross hanging from the rafters of the building.

Calveley School

St. Oswald's Worleston School donation hub for the Ukrainian Refugees:

Once the children at St. Oswald's heard about the plight of the Ukrainian families fleeing the war in their country, they sprang into action to help as best they could. We managed to find a local Polish charity that was transporting donations down to London and then on to Refugee centres in Poland. Within the space of a few days, Mr Goodwin's office had been filled with a mountain of donations that were specifically requested such as nappies, sanitary products, pet food, blankets and duvets / sleeping bags and food. It was overwhelming to see the generosity of everyone in the whole St. Oswald's community and we managed to completely fill 2 horse trailers full of donations which were bound for Poland. All the children and staff in school have been thinking about and praying for the families caught up in the terrible circumstances in Ukraine.

Stay and Play in our Nursery and Reception Early Years Setting:

It has been heart-warming to be able to get back to some of the special events we hold in school but have not been able to do so over the past 2 years of the Pandemic. Stay and Play is one of these special family events in school that we have recently been able to reintroduce. This is when the parents of our Nursery and Reception children from the age of 3 years old to 5 years old get to come into the classroom and spend some time with their child learning alongside them and celebrating all their achievements. This has certainly been something that we've loved seeing back on the St. Oswald's calendar.

World Book Day:

On Thursday 3rd March, the children of St. Oswald's Worleston celebrated World Book Day by dressing up as their favourite book character for the day and sharing their favourite story. It was a wonderful day had by all and a great way to keep the 'love of reading' a high profile in school.

Recipe

Banana Muffins

This recipe has little sugar & almost no fat if you use half fat creme fraiche.

Makes 12 Muffins

Ingredients

- 125g (4.5 oz) Plain flour
- 1 tbsp Baking powder
- 1/2 tsp Bicarb of soda
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 225g (8oz) Mashed ripe banana riper the better!
- 4 tbsp caster sugar
- 60g (2oz) half fat creme fraiche
- 1 egg
- 1/2tsp vanilla extract.

Method

- * Preheat oven to 180C. Prepare muffin tin with 12 muffin cups.
- * Mix together flour, baking powder, bicarb & salt.
- * In a separate bowl, beat together banana, sugar, egg & vanilla. Stir in creme fraiche. Stir banana mixture into flour.
- * Pour into cups and bake for approx 20mins or until skewer comes out clean.
- * Let cool before removing from the tin.


