
# God Save the King!

By the time the coronation comes, we will have celebrated the joyful news of the resurrection at Easter. However, the story of Jesus did not finish then. This month we remember Ascension Day when Jesus finally left his disciples to carry on his work and the work of his Kingdom here on earth. In the 'olden days' children in church schools had the day off, but not anymore.

When Jesus went back to his heavenly father, he didn't leave his disciples to carry on alone, but sent the Holy Spirit to be their helper, friend and guide. We remember this at Pentecost, or Whit Sunday as it used to be called. We are assured that Jesus will never leave us or forsake us, and that nothing can separate us from his love.

We are certainly going to have a month of celebrations!

As children we were all told to "Sit up straight!" As we get older our range of movement naturally diminishes and our lifestyles and bad postural habits have taken their toll. But we can do something about it! While we will never regain the perfect posture of a toddler we all felt much better after an hour with Elizabeth Hinton, a retired PE teacher who led us in Chair Pilates at our recent birthday meeting. Beginning with how to sit and stand correctly, she led us through a range of simple purposeful movements using light weights and tennis balls to help us think about how we can increase strength and improve muscle tone and body alignment. A leotard and masses of equipment isn't needed! Many of the exercises can be done while ironing, watching television, even waiting in the supermarket queue. She provided all the information to help us do them at home with a warning that we won't improve overnight but we can make muscles work consciously over time. # Nantwich 10k

Runners get up to speed at the Nantwich 10 kilometre road race.

The 2nd annual 'Nantwich 10k' road race took place on the morning of Sunday 2nd April 2023, this year organised by Run Through who are proudly supporting Alzheimer's Research UK. The event was sponsored by local solicitors, Hall Smith Whittingham LLP.

The race took more than 1,000 participants on a 10k (6.2 miles) loop on closed roads, starting and finishing close to Nantwich town square. The route passed St Mary's Acton on Monks Lane twice – on the outward leg and on the return leg back to Nantwich. The route this year was the same as last year, other than starting and finishing closer to the town centre.

Each finisher received a specially designed medal and a goodie bag. Runners also received a chipped time (or Set Time where the time is recorded from crossing the starting line to crossing the finish line, rather than from the race start signal).

# A Mid-Life Crisis?

A mid-life crisis? Maybe, but a worthwhile one!

Well that's what my family have suggested is going on with me; want to know why? St Luke's Cheshire Hospice is a small hospice based in Winsford. They receive limited support from the government which means that the vast majority of their running costs need to be raised through donations and fundraising. In fact, 84% of their care is funded by donations, fundraising, their lottery and charity shops.

This year the hospice has organised the ultimate sponsored walk; a Saharan trek, to help raise funds. Participants will be trekking in scorching heat, with no running water, so no showers or toilets for 3 days! The challenges for each individual taking on this adventure are very different but all have the same aim; to raise funds for this wonderful Hospice.

I have been working at St Lukes Hospice for 22 years, first on the Inpatient unit and then as Lymphoedema Specialist Practitioner with CCICP. The Lymphoedema service is a fabulous example of collaborative working between the Trust and St Lukes and I am so proud to play my part, serving the people of Central and South Cheshire. I am doing the Saharan trek because this year I have been supported by the bereavement counselling service and it's my way of saying thank you.

If you feel like me that 'Bucket list experiences' shouldn't be paid for by fundraising



you'll be pleased to know I'm paying my own expenses and any money I raise will go straight to St Luke's to continue their vital work. Yes that's right I'm paying for the privilege of walking 50km across the desert in scorching heat without any conveniences (No showers or loos!). If you would like to sponsor me to keep me going through my training and help me to support the fantastic care at St Lukes Hospice, I would be very grateful, but mostly I need your prayers as taking on this challenge will be no walk in the park! # Modern Martyrs; Wang Zhiming

# Modern Martyrs Westminster Abbey; Wang Zhiming

The Cultural Revolution [1966 - 76] in China led to the martyrdom of many Christians who came into conflict with the Red Army during those years of terror. They are represented at Westminster Abbey with a statue of Wang Zhiming, the only Christian martyr of this period in China to have his grave marked by a statue recognising his sacrifice. He was born in Yunnan in 1907 and attended a church school established by Western Christian evangelists working in Wuding County during this period. Eventually he became a teacher at a church school in the same area. Wuding became a centre for Chinese Christianity,



particularly in its minority populations, and by 1949 there were about 130,000 Protestant converts in Yunnan. This was about 20% of the Chinese total, and half of these lived in Wuding.

By 1944 Wang had been elected as the Chairman of his Church Council and was eventually ordained in 1951. As the cultural and political environment changed in China, he became one of six Miao Christian leaders who agreed to sign the Three Self Manifesto. This recognised some of the demands of the new government and allowed them to continue in the church. However, the day came when they were expected to take part in the public humiliation of local landlords. Wang refused to take part, saving that his hands were for baptism, not condemnation. This lead to him being labelled a counter - revolutionary even before the Cultural Revolution was declared.

During the Cultural Revolution 21 Christian leaders in Wuding were arrested, imprisoned and tortured. In 1969 Wang, his wife and sons, were arrested and he was imprisoned. Little is known about his period of imprisonment, but on 29th December 1973 he was taken in front of a crowd of 10,000 people, mainly Christians, and executed. The crowd reacted strongly to his death, refusing to be quelled by local Revolutionary officials.

After the end of the Cultural Revolution Wang's family received compensation for his death of 1.300 yuan [approx. \$250]. His legacy was not to be the statue on his grave, nor even the statue on Westminster Abbey, but the enormous growth of the church in Wuding. By 1980 there were 12,000 Christians in Wuding. This has now reached about 30,000 people and 100 churches despite sporadic persecution of believers, inspired by leaders who were prepared to die for their beliefs.

# Recipe

### **Coronation Chicken**

This recipe was first used at the coronation banquet at Buckingham Palace after the coronation of Queen Elizabeth in 1953. It was devised by Constance Fry, the florist, and Rosemary Hume then head of the Cordon Bleu Cookery School.

If you search for 'Coronation Chicken' you will find many variations and claims - for instance that sultanas and chutney were not used in the original but that red wine was. Probably cream was used and not creme fraiche in 1953 but we just don't know.

It would seem sensible if you use the ingredients which you and your family like best, and then serve up on a jacket potato or with a green salad or with rice or in any other way which you like.

Perhaps someone will invent a new recipe for the coronation of King Charles.

# Serves 6 Ingredients

- 2 tsp mild curry powder
- ☐ 150g (5 oz) mayonnaise
- 5 2 tbsp mango chutney
- 2 celery sticks finely chopped
- 5 75g (3oz) dried ready-to-eat apricots, chopped
- 50g (2oz) sultanas

  □
- 50g (2oz) flaked almonds
- Large handful fresh coriander, chopped

### Method

- Heat a small frying pan and toast the curry powder until it smells fragrant about 30 secs
- Empty into a large bowl and stir through the next 7 ingredients plus salt and pepper.
- Cut the chicken into bite-sized pieces and add to the mayonnaise mixture, along with most of the flaked almonds and chopped coriander. Stir well and check seasoning.
- To serve, garnish with the remaining almonds and coriander

### Note

This can be prepared the day before it's needed but leave the garnish until just before serving


